

Sunshine Circles is an interactive play-based curriculum designed to teach social skills and promote executive functioning development in the large group classroom setting. Skills such as empathy and perspective, joint attention, sharing and taking turns, body awareness, and impulse control are taught through large and small group social play activities. Each Sunshine Circles session is split into three categories of engagement in play; nurturing play, mastery play and challenging play. Nurturing play models relationship building by allowing teachers opportunities to nurture their students and build attachment and trust. Mastery play builds self-confidence in students through play that is familiar and fun. Challenging play is used to introduce new social concepts that require practice and development. This session is designed to review the basic tenants of the Sunshine Circles programming and provide specific examples of play-based activities used within the model.


Comer Yates




Paul Sommer, MBA, CPXP




Tera Quigley, AuD, CCC-A


Ryan Lee-James, PhD, CCC-SLP

Dr. Ryan Lee-James, language and literacy expert in the context of linguistic differences and socioeconomic disadvantage; is an SLP, researcher, and published author. As Chief Academic Officer and Director of the Rollins Center for Language & Literacy at Atlanta Speech School, she and her dynamic team develop and hone academic programming across the School which serves children who have hearing loss, speech-language delays, and dyslexia. The team translates that programming to online content through Cox Campus: free, equity-based, online professional learning. Through Rollins, Dr. Lee-James also leads the design, implementation and evaluation of large-scale programs to improve language and literacy outcomes for children from birth through 3rd grade who have been systemically disenfranchised. Previously, Dr. Lee-James served as a member of the Communication Sciences and Disorders faculty at a university in

New York, and is active on numerous national and local boards to realize literacy and justice for all.










Sondra Mims, M.A., CCC-SLP




Kate Bousum, CFRE




Melanie Morris, Au.D.


Sherri Nighbert

Meeting Families Where They Are Through Parent Navigation, Tele-Audiology and Mobile Clinics

Sherri Nighbert is a Parent Navigator for Georgia Mobile Audiology, a program through Georgia Department of Education, serving children birth-22 years of age around the State of Georgia. Sherri is a mother of a child who is deaf and a bilateral Cochlear Implant user, fully mainstreamed in the Cobb County school district. Sherri has a bachelor's degree in business communication from the College of Charleston. Sherri was the Grant Manager & Lead Parent Navigator under the initiative, Access to Language (AtL), a grant designed by the Atlanta Speech School and funded by the Oberkotter Foundation from 2018 to 2022. The platform uses a single Parent Navigator, who guides families through the confusing process of inpatient hearing screening, outpatient hearing screening, diagnostic testing, and enrollment into intervention (www.accesstolanguage.org). Sherri is motivated by building the DHH Georgia community to prevent loss to follow up and make sure no parent or child ever feels alone.




Kelly Jenkins

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

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
